The Railway Children



The second play of the present season is *'The Railway Children'* written by Edith Nesbit, adapted by Dave Simpson. Set in and around a country railway station at the turn of the twentieth century, the plight of the Railway Children grappling with their new environment is imaginatively brought to life for a modern audience while losing nothing of the original spirit of humour, tension, adventure and the final triumph of good over evil.

Nesbit originally wrote *'The Railway Children'* as a magazine serial. The 1970 film adaptation of E. Nesbit's story is regarded as its definitive telling, its popular memory greater than that of her novel. It had also been adapted for television in earlier years there are links between the last serial and the feature film. Both used Yorkshire's Keighley and Worth Valley Preservation Railway and featured *Jenny Agutter* as Bobbie.

This production is being directed by Garth Jones who, last season, appeared as Sir in *The Dresser*. Garth has a great deal of experience as Director and Actor and is adept at bringing a large ensemble into a team and then eliciting a fine performance.

'MEMORY LANE'

Every now and then something happens to jog the memory and we look back in the records and check it out. This time I asked the question "what was the first play in this venue" and the answer is "Don't Listen Ladies" in November 1962. This prompted a look into David Lane's Theatre Social Diary and to one of the events held to provide income to assist the purchase of the Theatre. There is a report of the "Supper Dance" at the Bowdon Hydro Club, Friday 18th May 1962. There were 41 attendees at 15 shillings each, with a total of £30-15s-0d. Expenses were £10-0s-0d for the band, Fish & Chips at £2-19s-6d and biscuits at 5s-0d. This left £17-10s-6d but the room at the Hydro was not paid for.

The evening was "invaded" by members of the Bowdon Hydro Club who refused to leave and David Lane, the then Chairman, was very angry that they were treated thus that he refused to pay. This despite being threatened with being sued, whereupon David wrote "I would welcome the opportunity of stating my case in court." He heard no more except that the gatecrashers had to pay for the room rental. Not a man to get the wrong side of and I count myself privileged to not only have known him but to be Theatre Secretary and then Vice-Chairman under him.

Footnote:-Incidentally "Don't Listen Ladies" was the last play that Vicki Lane directed before she died in 2000.
